## Challenge

L1: To use apostrophes for possession

An **apostrophe** is the same shape as a comma (,) but placed above the line (').

Apostrophes can be used to show that one thing belongs to another.

When we are talking about one thing, we call this **singular** (e.g. one rabbit).

When we need to say that something belongs to something singular, we put an apostrophe (') and then the letter 's' at the end of the name it belongs to.

**Example:** Mr McGregor's tool-shed had been built many years ago.

Can you use apostrophes in your own sentences about the things in the table below? There are some verbs to help you too but you do not have to use these verbs.

| Things to write sentences about      | Verbs to help you |
|--------------------------------------|-------------------|
| The nose belonging to Peter Rabbit   | sniffed           |
| The basket belonging to Mrs. Rabbit  | hung              |
| The garden belonging to Mr. McGregor | weeded            |
| The song belonging to the sparrow    | heard             |
| The sieve belonging to Mr. McGregor  | fell              |
| The blackberries belonging to Flopsy | tasted            |
