LI: To use apostrophes for possession

An **apostrophe** is the same shape as a comma (,) but placed above the line (').

Apostrophes can be used to show that one thing belongs to another.

When we are talking about one thing, we call this singular (e.g. one rabbit).

When we need to say that something belongs to something singular, we put an apostrophe (') and then the letter 's' at the end of the name it belongs to.

Example: the rabbit's back leg
